My Football Boots by George Govier

World War Two had ended and I spent my school days at Trull School. People my age had to spend an extra year at school. I loved all sport and played any sport I could. Four of us were picked to play football for Taunton Schools, three were in the team and I was the reserve. My Dad died in 1945 and money was always short. So, when I told my mum, she said you need new boots. I had always played in a pair of rugby boots given to me by my Dad's employer's son who went to Queens College. But my mum insisted!

We lived at Boxenhedge and had to walk to Taunton. On the way, we passed Hillbrook House and Trull Cricket Field. We also passed Trull Green where an evacuee hut had been built. It was a haven of peace for evacuees and others. It provided tea and cakes for everyone including airmen from the arifelds on the hills above Blagdon, Trickey Warren, Smeathorpe and Dunkeswell. We headed for Taunton. On the way, we passed the Old Vicarage where my rugby boots came from. We passed Queens College and had a wave from the sentry at Sherford Camp. Further along the road, we walked past Belmont sick bay where wounded servicemen were treated. We passed Shire Hall and Taunton Police Station.

At the shoe shop, my Mum told the man in charge that we needed a pair of cheap football boots. He told us the cheapest were about two pounds. My Mum said we could not afford them. The man said 'Hang on a minutel' and he disappeared. He returned with a pair of green football boots. My Mum said 'They are green.' I loved them, they were two shillings and sixpence. We bought them, thanked the man and headed home. There were many laughs in the family about the green boots. I smiled. On Saturday, another Trull player nearly fell off his bike when he saw the green boots. At the football pitch at Amberd Lane, all the team gathered around laughing.

I believe my green boots helped me during my football days, looking and laughing at my green boots, they hardly noticed me! Haha!

Court Fields helps open new classroom in Madagascar



Court Fields School has once again demonstrated its commitment to global education and community development by cofunding the construction of a new pre-primary classroom at Antsampanimahazo Primary School in Madagascar. The classroom was officially inaugurated on 25th September in a joyful ceremony attended by local dignitaries, including the Member of Parliament for Antsirabe 2.

This latest initiative is part of a long-standing partnership between Court Fields School and the Madagascar Development Fund, aimed at improving educational opportunities for children in some of Madagascar's most underserved communities. The project was also supported by Friends of Hassocks Infant School, whose contributions helped bring the classroom to life.



For many of the young pupils, this classroom marks their first experience of formal education, offering them a brighter start and a stronger foundation for future learning.

A detailed report on the inauguration is expected to follow, but early feedback from the school and local community has been overwhelmingly positive. "The new classroom is making an enormous difference to young children who are attending school for the first time," said a spokesperson from the Madagascar Development Fund. "We, the children and their teachers, are very, very grateful."

Court Fields School's continued support for international development projects reflects its values of compassion, global citizenship, and educational equity. This latest success adds to a growing legacy of meaningful contributions to Madagascar's educational infrastructure.

St Ives Trip 2025

A group of our students kicked off October half term with an unforgettable creative adventure, as they enjoyed an Art trip to St Ives. Students started the trip in style with a visit to the Eden Project, where the stunning biomes and immersive exhibits sparked inspiration and curiosity. With everyone settled in and excited, the group looked forward to a busy few days ahead.

Surf, Sun, and Sketchbooks

Day two began bright and early, with students enjoying a rare moment of sunshine. Donning winter wetsuits, they headed out for a surf lesson, embracing the waves and the challenge with enthusiasm. The experience was both exhilarating and energising. An ideal way to connect with the coastal environment before diving into the day's artistic activities.

Mark Making in the Mist

Later that afternoon, the group engaged in experimental mark making—not quite on the beach due to the classic English drizzle, but still full of creative energy. Students explored texture, gesture, and spontaneity, using the surrounding landscape as inspiration. The weather didn't dampen spirits; if anything, it added character to the work.

Sketchbook Reflections and Comfort Food

After warming up with some delicious mac and cheese, the evening was dedicated to sketchbook work. Students reflected on the day's experiences, layering their pages with drawings, notes, and mixed media. The quiet focus of the evening allowed ideas to settle and take shape, setting the stage for deeper exploration.

Capturing Light with Chris Webber

The next morning featured a photography walking tour led by Chris Webber Photography, who shared expert tips on maximising natural light in compositions. From narrow alleyways to sweeping sea views, students learned to see St Ives through a new lens—literally and figuratively—capturing the town's unique atmosphere with skill and creativity.

Cyanotype Workshop: Art Meets Science

The trip culminated in a cyanotype workshop, where students created striking blue-toned prints using natural and UV light. As the pieces developed over the afternoon, anticipation grew. Watching the images slowly emerge was a magical moment, blending science and art in a way that captivated everyone.

Court Fields students returned not only with prepped sketchbooks, for further personal develop in response to the trip, but with memories of shared laughter, learning, and artistic growth.



Rights Respecting Schools

A Rights Respecting School (RRS) is an educational approach developed by UNICEF that embeds the principles of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) into the school's ethos, curriculum, and daily practices.

Here's what it means in practice:

Child-Centered Philosophy: The school ensures that every child knows their rights and understands the responsibilities that come with them.

Respect and Equality: It promotes respect for the rights of others, fostering an inclusive and safe environment.

Participation: Students are encouraged to have a voice in decisions affecting them, such as school rules or learning activities.

Global Citizenship: It helps children understand their role in a wider world and the importance of human rights globally





Bronze Award

We are thrilled to announce that Court Fields School has been awarded the Bronze UNICEF Rights Respecting School Award (RRSA)!

The RRSA is a UK-wide initiative led by UNICEF that supports schools in embedding the principles of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) into their ethos and curriculum. The aim is to create a school environment where children's rights are learned, taught, respected, protected, and promoted—empowering young people to become active, engaged citizens.

Headteacher, Mrs Matthews shared her pride in the achievement:

"We are incredibly proud to have achieved the Bronze UNICEF Rights Respecting School Award. This recognition reflects our commitment to creating a school environment where every member of our community feels valued, heard, and empowered. At Court Fields, we believe that teaching children and young people about their rights—and the importance of respecting the rights of others - helps build a stronger, kinder community both within and beyond our school gates. We are now excited about our journey to achieving Silver."

This award marks an important milestone in our journey to becoming a fully Rights Respecting School. We look forward to continuing our work to ensure that every student at Court Fields feels safe, supported, and inspired to make a positive difference in the world.

RRSA Enrichment Day

All staff and students paused for the day on 18th November to consider Article 2, Non-Discrimination.

In tutor groups students explored why the UN wrote Human Rights in 1947. They considered what a world would be like if people didn't have access to Human Rights. Students evaluated why it took until 1989 for the Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) to be written. Tutor groups considered what improved for young people under the UNCRC. The session closed with all tutor groups across the school writing their own class charter using the UNCRC.

In the second session we considered the attitude towards woman and girls by firstly understanding when the difference in roles came into light. Tutor groups considered what it means to be treated fairly, and all tutor groups understood what the white ribbon promise means, and they took the pledge if they wished.

It was wonderful as a school to step forward in our learning journey in understanding the integral importance of belonging to a school which puts the convention of the Rights of the child up front and centre.

Students had the opportunity to listen to a band who put non-discrimination at the centre of the music. It was wonderful to see students enjoy this experience.

All students throughout the day also considered the language they use and the negative impact it can have towards others. We are already looking forward to the next RRSA Enrichment Day!

Sparx Homework Awards


This term we have been rewarding students for completing their Sparx homework in Maths, English and Science.

Below are all our winners to date. Well done all!




Friday Challenge

English

The English department have had a wonderful start to the year! Here is an update of what we've been working on...

Our new **Year 7** students began their journey at Court Fields in the Den - 'Dragons' Den'! They applied their newly acquired knowledge of

persuasive techniques and Aristotle's famous rhetorical triad to convince their peers to invest in their creative product ideas. We saw some extraordinary concepts and a range of deserving winners. To conclude the unit, students used their understanding of rhetoric to deliver highly persuasive speeches on how we could make our school even more environmentally friendly.



Year 8 students are currently immersed in the dystopian genre - dictators, surveillance, ruined landscapes, loss of freedom, and a struggle for individuality? Check! They have explored these conventions through a range of powerful extracts, from Orwell's *1984* to Suzanne Collins' *The Hunger Games*. Embracing the role of a dystopian author, students have produced some outstanding short stories. Well done, Year 8!

Students in **Year 9** were transported back to 1930s America to analyse John Steinbeck's 'Of Mice and Men'. They have been deeply engaged with the friendship between Lennie and George and were outraged by the hardships faced by many individuals living the isolated life of a ranch worker. We are proud of how thoughtfully, sensitively, and respectfully our students explored the novella's themes, including race, gender, ableism, age, and more. They also considered Steinbeck's intentions in writing the text and produced some fantastic analytical essays. In January, we will take our students back to Elizabethan England to immerse them in the conflict between the Montagues and Capulets—will love triumph? We can't wait to study 'Romeo and Juliet'!





Year 10 students have made an impressive start to their GCSE English Literature course, delving deeply into the characters and themes of 'A Christmas Caro'l. As the festive season approaches, their focus will shift to exploring Dickens' purpose in crafting a moral tale rooted in Christmas traditions. Students will also have the chance to watch a film adaptation, but this time through the lens of a literary critic—seeing the characters not as simple caricatures, but as deliberate constructs designed to convey Dickens' views on social inequality in Victorian society.

Year 11 began the year by seeking justice for Eva Smith's tragic death, following the Inspector's interrogation of the Birling family through their study of *An Inspector Calls*. It was fantastic to see students engage so thoughtfully with J.B. Priestley's political play. Since then, they have completed their PPEs in both Language and Literature. We look forward to using these papers to target in-class revision and support students in the lead-up to their second round of PPEs in March. Keep going, Year 11!



Maths

It's been an incredibly busy and exciting term in the Maths department!

We've loved welcoming our new Year 7 students, who have made a brilliant start to their secondary Maths journey. They've been tackling topics like simplifying algebraic notation and measuring length, mass, and capacity. Recently, they've been learning how to convert between different metric units—so why not get them involved in some festive activities over the holidays? Encourage them to help in the kitchen to practise converting measurements of mass, or let them join in with wrapping presents to work on converting between millimetres and centimetres.

Years 8 and 9 have been focusing on fractions,

percentages, and a variety of algebraic equations. Year 10 has taken its first steps into the world of trigonometry, while Year 11 has been working hard to prepare for their first PPEs. Many of them can now sing along to the Circle Song and the Trigonometry Song—Mrs Smith's favourites!

This term our students have once again been getting creative in the kitchen.

Year 7 started by covering basic skills, with a focus on health and safety, in preparation for their first enrichment experience with UCS (formally BTC). We were lucky enough to have a day of master class instruction from UCS Taunton in November. We had 200 students all making Mille Feuille in one day. They learned how to prepare some more exotic unusual fruits such as dragon fruit and papaya as well as piping creme diplomat and decorating. A fantastic experience enjoyed immensely by every student and staff member, not to mention the yummy eating element!



Year 9 have had a new Scheme of Learning this year, Love Your Food. They have been working together for the group projects, including pasta and sauce reduction making. They have been creating family classics such as Lasagne, pizza and curry.

They have also been creating technically challenging dishes, with the ever popular Star Bread featuring this week.

Year 10 have been looking at Macro and Micronutrients and special diets and have been preparing food related to the topic. A variety of high-quality dishes have been produced from healthy soups with brioche rolls, to technical Lattice pies with other dishes being more organisationally challenging in nature such as mini roast dinners with own choice of accompaniments.

World Views

Year 7 have started World Views with a bang! Their philosophical and debating skills have been impressive. We have had many enjoyable lessons exploring what makes the identity of not only ourselves but also our local community. Our recent discussions around the Church and asking, 'Is it still important for Wellington today', was lively and resulted in a unanimous decision that it is still important due to all the support, guidance, groups and celebrations it holds for the local community.









Since September **Year 8** have been considering in a growing climate crisis, we explore the impact we have personally and as a society on the environment. We evaluate the concept of Stewardship and Dominion has had upon our environment. Through studying Neo-Pagans and indigenous communities we investigate how these communities treat the environment and think about what we can learn from them. Finally, we explore possible strategies to bring about change – individually/ as a community/country/globally to work towards sustainability.

In **Year 9** students have been retrieving knowledge about Judaism from primary school and we have been building upon this prior knowledge. They have learnt about the Shema prayer and the importance of the Jewish covenant. They have investigated the discrimination of the Jews throughout history and understood what was the causing factor. They have then moved onto understanding the plight of the Jews throughout the Holocaust and Hitler's final solution to the Jewish problem. Finally ending in the philosophical question around how can Jews still believe in God after the Holocaust?





In core World Views lessons in **Year 10** students have been focusing upon medical ethics. As we advance in medicine, we must begin to consider the ethics behind the choices we make. During the course students have been considering various issues such as abortion, euthanasia, animal testing, fertility treatment, surrogacy, and genetic engineering. Students have enjoy evaluating current issues which have appeared in the news and evaluated the response of government and religion.

It has been exciting to introduce Religious Studies to Court Fields School this year. Currently the two GCSE option groups are studying Buddhism. As we explore this philosophical approach to life, we have considered what led Prince Siddhartha to reject his wealthy life and peruse a life as an ascetic. We have explored the how living a balanced life can lead to inner peace and happiness. Currently we are considering how karma could have a positive impact upon global ethics.




















Year 10 Photography work



This year has been an exciting and enriching one in the Science Department, with students across all year groups immersing themselves in new topics, practical investigations and a wide range of special STEM enrichment opportunities. Each year group has built on their scientific understanding through hands-on learning, curiosity and collaboration, and their enthusiasm has been clear to see.

Our Year 7 students have made an excellent start to secondary science. They began the year learning about cells, using microscopes to explore the tiny structures that make up all living things. They then moved on to studying particles, discovering how the behaviour of solids, liquids and gases can be explained at a microscopic level, before investigating forces and the ways pushes, pulls and gravity influence movemen To celebrate World Space Day, Year 7 took part in an off-timetable STEM session where they were challenged to design a habitat suitable for human life on Mars. Their futuristic ideas and imaginative engineering solutions demonstrated impressive creativity.

Year 8 students have continued to develop their scientific understanding by exploring body systems and learning how different organs work together to keep us alive and healthy. They have also studied methods of separating mixtures, carrying out practical work using filtration, distillation and chromatography. Their unit on waves allowed them to build on their knowledge of how sound and light travel. To mark World Astronomy Day, Year 8 enjoyed an astronaut training session in which they tested their teamwork, resilience and problem-solving skills through space-themed challenges.

In Year 9, students have been delving into chemical reactions, observing how substances change and exploring the patterns that help chemists predict reactivity. They also studied enzymes, discovering how these biological catalysts play essential roles in digestion and other life processes. Their work on electricity involved building circuits and investigating how energy is transferred and transformed. To celebrate Earth Science Day, Year 9 students took part in a STEM challenge to design and build their own water filtration systems, applying their scientific knowledge to real-world

environmental issues. A lucky few also enjoyed an exciting science trip to Hinkley Point C, where they saw the development of large scale nuclear engineering in action and learned about the future of low carbon energy

production.

Year 10 students, now well into their GCSE studies, have been developing deeper knowledge across all three

sciences. In biology they have been learning about cell biology, examining the structures and functions that underpin life. In physics, their studies on energy have focused on energy stores, conservation and efficiency, while in chemistry, they have explored atomic structure and the ways the arrangement of particles inside atoms explains patterns in chemical behaviour. These topics form a vital foundation for the more advanced GCSE units to come.

Our Year 11 students have been working hard as they approach their final examinations.

In biology they have studied homeostasis, gaining an understanding of how the body maintains stable internal conditions. Their physics lessons have focused on forces, motion and the mathematical relationships that describe how objects interact, while in chemistry they have investigated rates of reaction, examining how factors such as temperature and concentration can influence the speed of chemical change. Their commitment and focus this year have been impressive.


It has been a brilliant year so far, filled with discovery, imagination and practical science in action. We are immensely proud of our students' enthusiasm and hard work, and we look forward to many more exciting lessons, experiments and STEM opportunities throughout the rest of the academic year. Science is thriving at Court Fields School, and we thank all our parents and carers for supporting their children as they explore and understand the world around them.






History

Year 7 started off with an introduction to Historical Skills and have since moved onto develop their enquiry skills on 'How did the Tollund Man die?'. Students look at a range of sources, their






content, their origin and their nature to decide how valid they are in helping them answer the question. Student are also introduced to the concept of 'significance' and why the Tollund man is how unique in how he was preserved.

Students have since moved onto the settlers and migrants that came to England during the Dark Ages, to forge a comparison to the following topic on The Battle of Hastings and the impact that William I had on England.

Year 8 started their academic year with a new topic, where they learnt about the causes and consequences of the Renaissance, and how this sparked the Reformation that enabled Henry VIII to break with Rome, form his own church and remarry. Student's within each lesson analysed the issue of religion and how this led to the Tudor 'religious rollercoaster' which stemmed from the





changes in Europe, and Henry VIII's desire for a male heir.

Students are now learning about how far Elizabeth dealt with her problems, looking at Spain, marriage, colonisation and Mary Queen of Scots.

Year 9 began their academic year by looked at the 'Causes of WW1', looking at the MAIN issues (militarism, alliances, imperialism and nationalism) beginning with the rise of German nationalism from winning the Franco-Prussian war and Serbia rising out of the Balkans Wars as a challenge to Austria-Hungary. These complicated political issues really put into context why the Assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand happened and students could compare, analyse and evaluated the most significant cause/s of WW1 in the short and long term. Students are looking at historians' interpretations of the past in both their lessons and assessments to draw links towards how historian's form opinions and why they differ. In the second part of the term, students are learning about the impact and changes that WW1

brought to those in the 20th century; looking at topics such as medicine, military technology, the Home front, soldiers of the empire and women.

Modern Forgeign Languages

As always, it has been a busy term in the Modern Foreign Languages faculty!! At the end of September, we held our annual House & Tutor Group competition to mark the European Day of Languages, and to promote the importance of language skills in today's multicultural society. The winning tutor groups in each Year were: 7B1, 8M2, 9M1, 10B2, 11B2 with **MONUMENT** emerging as the overall winning house!

In curriculum time in Spanish, Year 7 have been finding out more about Spanish-speaking countries and communities around the world, and learning the fundamentals of the language. The particular focus has been upon the way words are

pronounced (phonics), as well as using an increasing variety of vocabulary and grammatical structures to talk about their age, birthdays, pets, siblings and personality. In **Year 8**, students have been learning to talk in greater depth about a range of different aspects of holidays, such as transport, accommodation, activities and opinions. In **Year 9**, students have written about their varied likes and dislikes, learned to talk about what they do in their spare time and discussed how they plan to celebrate an upcoming birthday.


Students in Year 10 have begun their GCSE courses, while Year 11 students have been revising hard for their recent PPEs.

Geography

Year 7 started off with an introduction to the continent of Africa. Students have shown a fantastic awareness of the world around them and have developed an understanding of some of Africa's human and physical features, as well as their ecosystems. In addition to this, our year 7 students have started to develop their awareness of global issues and showed fantastic maturity and consideration for those that are less fortunate when looking at the issue of famine and drought in parts of Africa. A big well done to year 7! As we look ahead our year 7s will now begin to look at landscapes and the impact of climate change.

Year 8 started their academic year with the topic of settlement; within this they have learnt about the different types of settlement and have linked this to the presence of services and the threshold population. In addition to this, they all explored the challenges faced in settlements around the world, such as the megacity of Mumbai. They have now started their enquiries in Wellington and shown resilience and bravery when speaking to the public for their questionnaires, this information is going to be shared with the local council to support the community plan. A huge thank you to Laura from the council who came to speak to some of our year 8s to support them in designing their questionnaires!

Year 9 began their academic year by looked at the tectonic hazards. In this topic, they explored the earth's tectonic plates and looked at how their movement can cause a range of hazards such as earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and tsunamis. Students have been developing their case study knowledge looking at real world examples of each hazard, such as the infamous Indian Ocean tsunami of 2004. As they move towards Christmas, year 9 are going to start looking at population – this will include looking at the reasons for population increase and the challenges this poses. We will be discussing Geography GCSE with them over the coming weeks in preparation for their futures programme, as they begin to decide their options subjects.

Year 10 have had a wonderful start to the year and have worked hard to adapt to the demands of GCSE Geography. They started the year exploring urban environments including the opportunities and challenges in cities, they have developed their place detail through looking at Lagos and Freiburg. They then had some time to focus much closer to home, with the regeneration of Bristol and the opportunities it brings to the south west. Ending this half term, students have started to focus on weather hazards including global atmospheric circulation and the impacts of Typhoon Haiyan. They will shortly begin to the look at the causes and mitigation of climate change as they head into the new year.

Year 11 have had a busy start to the year in Geography starting the year looking at coasts, this included a slightly wet visit to Dawlish Warren to measure the effectiveness of coastal management. They have then moved on to consider resource management, looking at how we can sustain the water, food and energy resources on the planet. All students have shown a good attitude to their geography PPE and have done their 6 week revision plan to help them prepare and support them in experiencing success in the lead up to their final exams.



Wellbeing & Safeguarding

Power for Good: KS3 PSHCE and Student Wellbeing

This term following on from Anti-Bullying week, our focus has shifted to the theme "Power for Good", encouraging students to recognise the positive impact they can have within our school and wider community. KS3 PSHCE lessons are now embedded in the curriculum with a strong emphasis on developing the Court Fields Characteristics:

- Resilience building strength to overcome challenges
- Ambition striving for personal and academic success
- Leadership inspiring and supporting others

These lessons aim to empower students to use their voices and actions to create a culture of respect, kindness, and responsibility.

We are fortunate to have many partners keen to work with us over the next year to further develop our curriculum and wellbeing provision. Anti-Bullying Week saw students take part in a range of activites and we continue to spread the message #BeKind. The focus was on peer support and ensuring everyone in our community plays a role in stopping bullying. We continue to work with *Stand Against Violence*, who will return later in the year to deliver assemblies and workshops.



We are proud to announce that we have been awarded the Rights Respecting School Bronze Award. This achievement reflects our commitment to embedding the principles of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child into our school culture. To celebrate, we held an Enrichment Day focused on:

- Understanding the Rights of the Child
- Exploring misogyny and its impact on society
- Making the White Ribbon Promise to stand against gender-based violence

These sessions encouraged students to think critically about equality, respect, and their role in creating a safer, fairer community.

Healthy Mobile Phone Usage: Research and Innovation

We are excited to share that Year 9 and Year 10 students are taking part in a study exploring the impact of mobile phone use on wellbeing. Alongside this, we are analysing our own school data to shape education that promotes healthy habits online.

As part of the project, students will have the opportunity to trial a new app designed to support positive digital behaviours, helping them manage screen time and online interactions effectively. This initiative is not only about empowering students but also about working closely with families—we look forward to developing parental support resources to encourage healthy mobile phone usage at home.

Safeguarding and Mental Health Support

Safeguarding remains at the heart of the Court Fields Experience. We have relaunched the self-referral system for students to seek support if needed. Students can email the school directly to access help for mental health or wellbeing concerns. We are also working closely with the Mental Health in Schools Team to ensure access to both internal and external support.

Our students are fantastic at speaking to us if they ever feel worried or upset. For those who prefer not to talk in person, Tootoot remains available as a confidential reporting tool. We monitor concerns closely and respond

quickly to provide support.

Looking ahead, we will host another Enrichment Day in February 2026, covering a range of safeguarding and wellbeing topics.
