We can't wait to get started on our Transition Programme 2023, which runs from now until the start of the new school year, so that our new students arrive with us at the start of September ready to learn, confident, and happy in their new school. This will start with Mrs Westwood and I visiting the Primary Schools to meet our prospective Year 7s over the next 2 weeks, to say hi, introduce them to our friendly faces and have a brief chat about the transition process. We can't wait!!

To top off a super sporty week last week-well done to all who participated in the friendly badminton fixtures v Castle and Tiverton Schools. We hope you enjoyed the occasion, some excellent Badminton on display.



Last week the Science department arranged for 40 Year 9 students to visit the largest construction site in Europe, the site of the UK's first new nuclear power station in over 20 years. Students were given a presentation on the importance of moving from nonrenewable to renewable electricity generation, the importance of the



knowledge learnt in Triple Science GCSE and where it is being directly applied by scientists working on Hinkley Point C. The presenter also shared information about apprenticeships available at Hinkley with EDF, some of these being paid degree level apprenticeships, meaning you earn a degree whilst working.

Students were able to visit the interactive visitors centre, where they experimented with testing for radioactivity with



Geiger counters and the most effective structures of turbines, alongside exploring the structure of Hinkley itself. Finally, we visited the construction site by coach and saw both reactors being built and were introduced to the largest crane in the world-Big Carl! Book of the Week

This informative and powerful book about climate justice makes a real impact. It discusses what is happening to our planet, from melting polar ice caps to raging wildfires, and explores what's causing this devastation, with suggestions about how to effect change, both individually and collectively. The author's fundamental message is that the climate crisis is

inextricably linked to inequality, particularly racial discrimination. She argues that, to achieve climate justice, we must first understand the unjust systems that underpin most societies and work together to ensure a better future for everyone. A wealth of topics are covered, including systemic racism, identity and privilege, the role of big corporations and climate tipping points.

There are suggested activities throughout the book, for example: keeping a climate change diary to track variations in your local area; understanding how your community

uses energy; and thinking of five things that give you hope for a better world.

A comprehensive glossary explains some key terminology and concepts, such as white supremacy and extractive capitalism, and there are suggestions for further reading at the end. Attractively designed with stylish, colourful illustrations throughout, this thought-provoking book is sure to galvanise and empower young people to make a difference.
