They received a final briefing from their instructor before setting off using their planned plotted routes. The two-day trek would take them through varied terrain, testing their navigation skills, stamina, and teamwork along the way.

The end of day one involved students pitching their tents and cooking meals on portable stoves.

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ST IVES

Last month, Court Fields School took 15 eager Key Stage 4 students off for a long weekend down to the stunning Cornish coastal town of St. Ives. As the UK's number one spot for artists and photographers, they soaked up the atmosphere and immersed themselves in everything the town could offer. Plus, it wouldn't be a trip to Cornwall without a chilly dip in the North Atlantic with the fabulous St. Ives Surf School.

The trip started on Friday 25th October, with a visit to the incredible Eden Project. Once there, students spent time exploring both the Rainforest and Mediterranean biomes, taking photos and drawing sketches of everything they saw. From there the group travelled south to St. Ives, arriving at Cohort St. Ives Youth Hostel. They were greeted by lovely staff who showed them to their rooms before a dinner of pizza, everybody's favourite!

On day two, students headed to Porthmeor beach to join the Surf School for a 2 hour lesson. Everyone got involved despite the water being freezing! Nevertheless, the sun was shining, the sky was a beautiful blue and, after some initial balancing difficulties, everyone managed to stand up at least once, including Art teachers Mrs Binmore and Miss West. Stars of the morning had to go to Eniola for her amazing perseverance and Kim and Flo for their skills, as they ended up out back catching some rather large waves, alongside the pro's.

After warming up with hot chocolate and coffee, the artists in the group joined Rowena Temples, local artist, back down on the beach for some mark-making workshops. The work the students developed was awesome and so lovely to watch them engaging with the professional. Meanwhile, the photographers in the group explored the harbour and the caves, where they were photographing all sorts of viewpoints. After lunch students enjoyed a walking art histo-



ry tour of the town and were immersed in the world of Barabra Hepworth and her strong connections to the town, during the war era. The evening was spent working on sketchbooks, beginning to create a record of the work that will support the children in their unit one.

Sunday morning saw the group taking a threehour walking photography tour with local professional photographer Chris Webber, who timed it perfectly to photograph St. Ives' resident seal, who popped his head up to say hello. Chris then took the lead and got students thinking about how they record what they see, allowing them to learn new tricks on iPhones, as well as giving the photography students a chance to really explore shutter speed and aperture. Following this they spent some brief time at the Barabra Hepworth Museum, before a story telling ghost walk tour of the darker side of St. Ives. Tour guide Shanty arrived fully dressed up with crook and lantern to lead the tour through smugglers dens and graveyards, where students heard old folk lore and some disturbing accounts of nighttime ghost activity.

The final morning took them to Tate St. Ives, a haven for both traditional and contemporary art, and perfectly situated in the heart of the beautiful arts town. Whilst there, students were toured and workshopped by Greg Humphries who really engaged the students in their drawing and understanding of abstract art, as well as putting themselves in the images.

On the 28th November, some of our Year 9 students had the incredible opportunity to visit Hinkley Point C, one of the largest construction projects in Europe and a vital part of the UK's energy future. The trip was both educational and inspiring, as students participated in an engaging workshop that explored the science and engineering behind nuclear energy. At the visitor centre, they delved into interactive exhibits that explained the process of electricity generation and the importance of sustainable energy sources. The highlight of the day was a guided coach tour around the site, where students saw the massive scale of construction and the cutting-edge technology being used to build this state-of-the-art power station. The trip not only enriched their understanding of electricity, a topic they've been studying in class, but also sparked curiosity about careers in science and engineering.


We are really looking forward to next term and lots more sporting opportunities for our students!

FOOD TECHNOLOGY

This term our students have been getting creative in the kitchen.

Year 7 have been covering basic skills, health and safety which have developed week by week. They have cooked a range of dishes including their first group project of cheese straws which went down a storm. Year 8 have been enhancing their skills cooking every week, they will be finishing this rotation with sweet treats of fruit crumble and shortbread ready for Christmas. Year 9 have been working on their NHS projects for this rotation. They choose 2 dishes for a specific condition, which they then prepare and present.

Year 10 have been looking at Macro and Micronutrients and have been preparing food related to the topic. A variety of high-quality dishes have been produced from healthy soups with brioche rolls to mini roast dinners with own accompaniments. Year 11 have been very busy with focus on coursework and PPE's.

TECHNOLOGY

It has been a busy term in Technology, students have covered a wide range of topics and outcomes.

Year 7 have been constructing bug hotels and pewter keyrings. Year 8 have rotated through technology and have worked on a variety of projects such as the sweet dispenser project, night light project and our 3D printing project. Students are certainly enjoying the 3D printing projects and they upskill and develop more complex designs to print. Year 9 have focussed on design strategies whilst also working towards the completion of the upcycled light project.

Our year ten's have really shown what they are capable of and have developed some complex work towards their first product design project. Definitely some of the most complex work that we have seen whilst using our new laser cutter.







ENGLISH

The English department has had another very busy start to the year! Here is an update of what we've been working on...



Sparx Reader:

This term, we have launched Sparx Reader with Years 7-9 and students are now competing to top the leaderboard in their class, year group and whole school. After an initial assessment, students have chosen their first books for homework reading and have been accruing points by answering questions on the texts they have read. The most

efficient way for students to do this is by reading the texts carefully as they are awarded bonus points for their accuracy when answering questions. Students have made a great start – keep up the good work!

Key Stage 3 Curriculum:

Our new **Year 7** students started their Courtfields English journey with a unit on rhetoric – the art of persuasion – exploring the techniques used in famous speeches and producing some very persuasive speeches of their own.

They have now moved on to their first Shakespeare unit: 'The Tempest' and have been exploring Prospero's relationships with other characters in the play.





After starting the year with a study of Shakespeare's 'Much Ado About Nothing', **Year 8** students have now moved on to study 'Dystopian Fiction' and have been reading a variety of extracts from novels within this genre, as well as producing their own dystopian settings and narratives.

Focusing on the skill of comparison, students in **Year 9** began the year with an exploration of Victorian Literature, focusing on how writers evoke strong feelings of injustice in their readers. Extracts from a range of texts by Charles Dickens were compared with a selection of poetry, exploring how writers of different text types coney similar meaning.



Following on from this, students have been developing their understanding of narrative structures through a short story unit. Students have been asked to read and analyse a range of short stories, as well as produce their own narratives.

Key Stage 4 curriculum:



Year 10 students have made an excellent start to both their GCSE English Language paper 1 and English Literature course, exploring the characters and themes in 'A Christmas Carol' in detail. The main focus is how Dickens presents Scrooge's journey from misanthropic miser to philanthropic reformed Christian, representing Dickens' hope for Victorian society.

Year 11 have been working hard preparing for their first set of PPEs. They have studied 'An Inspector Calls', gaining an insight into Priestley's social message for the post-war audience as well as revising Macbeth's key themes and ideas. They have also been introduced to the Language paper 2 – contemporary texts.



Enrichment:

On December 11th 50 Year 10 and 11 students had the opportunity to watch a live performance of 'A Christmas Carol' at Exmouth Pavilions. Watching live performances of set texts really helps students to understand plot, key ideas and character development.

MATHS

It has been an incredibly busy term within the Maths department!

We have really enjoyed meeting our new Year 7s, who have made a fantastic start on their secondary Maths journey, with some great work on rounding and measurement. They have been working on converting between different metric measurements, so please get them active in the kitchen over the Christmas period so they can put into practice their skills at converting between measurements of mass, or get them involved in wrapping presents, so they can convert between mm and cm.

Year 8 and 9 have been doing lots of work on fractions and ratio and the Year 10 pupils studying the higher GCSE course have learnt all about surds and quadratics. Our Year 11s have worked incredibly hard in preparing for their first PPEs and many know the lyrics to the Circle Song and the Trigonometry Song, as favoured by Mrs Smith

Congratulations to Jasmine P (Year 8), Orla P (Year 9) and Jakub M (Year 10) who have all reached the top 3 spots on the Sparx Maths XP leaderboard for homework undertaken since September.





The **Year 7s** have had a great start to PSHE since September. They have engaged really well with the lessons and had lots of discussions with their groups. They have been focusing on transition to Secondary School and all that comes with that. The groups showed their leadership skills at the start of November by coming up with ideas to raise money for Children in Need. There were some brilliant ideas with 4 groups running events on Friday 15th November, including bake sales and a beat the teacher keeper in the Sports Hall. They have more of a focus on healthy friendships this half-term in the lead up to Christmas.

Year 8s started looking at healthy friendships in September and are now focusing on their own mental health and self-esteem. They are looking at how to stay more positive including engaging in positive influences if they are online. We have also introduced some journalling to the start of their PSHE sessions where they write down reflections such as 3 things they're grateful for, or 3 things they do to unwind. This has been a good way to start the PSHE sessions each Wednesday morning.

Year 9s started looking at mental health in September and October with a focus on body image and social media before the October half-term. Since coming back from the October break, they have been focusing more on healthy relationships and will be looking at understanding boundaries and consent in the lead up to Christmas.

Year 10 started by looking at their transition to Key Stage 4, stresses that come with GCSEs and how to cope with stress and anxiety and when things become too difficult. They have started to look at understanding Citizenship this half-term and what the benefits and responsibilities are of being a citizen in the UK.

PSHE in **Year 11** has so far looked at coping strategies for stress in the lead up to their exams including a meditation with breathing work. We have also looked at sexual harassment in the workplace and the effects of porn, and we will be looking into harmful sexual behaviours as well as STIs and pregnancy in the next couple of months.




ART


Year 8 have been refining skills in analysing and presenting the work of others. This term we have been looking at the work of Nancy Standlee and making our own

SCIENCE

This term has been an exciting one for the Science Department, with students across all year groups diving into a wide range of fascinating topics. **Year 7** have

been laying the foundations of scientific understanding, exploring the fundamental concepts of particles, cells, and forces. Through hands-on experiments, they've learned how matter changes state, examined the microscopic structures of cells, and investigated the forces that govern movement and interaction in the world around us. Their enthusiasm and curiosity have been evident in every lesson.

Year 8 have tackled a diverse set of topics, expanding their scientific knowledge and practical skills. They explored the structure and function of body systems such as the respiratory and circulatory systems, performed experiments to separate mixtures using techniques like filtration and chromatography, and delved into the intriguing world of waves, investigating the behaviors of light and sound. Meanwhile, **Year 9** students have been building on their prior knowledge with more advanced topics, including chemical reactions, where they studied combustion and neutralization; body systems, focusing on the digestive system and homeostasis; and electricity, where they developed and tested circuits to understand current and voltage.

As students progress through school, their studies become even more rigorous and focused. Year 10 have embraced the challenges of the new AQA GCSE scheme, studying cell biology, disease, atomic structure, bonding, energy, and motion, all of which link theoretical science to real -world applications. Meanwhile, Year 11 have been demonstrating their determination and resilience as they prepared for and completed their first round of Pre-Public Examinations (PPEs). Their hard work across biology, chemistry, and physics has been inspiring, and they are well on their way to achieving great success.

With another productive term behind us, we look forward to what's to come, including more hands -on learning opportunities, exciting projects, and even trips to deepen students' engagement with science. The journey of discovery continues, and we can't wait to see what the next term will bring!

Science Competition



Years 7, 8 and 9 were invited to demonstrate their creative thinking and show their understanding this term, by making models about cells (Year 7 and 8) and the digestive system (Year 9). The standard has been outstanding with exceptional demonstrations of their understanding and applica-

tion of knowledge.

The team spent a long time discussing the entries as all were brilliant, but the final winners were: Lois R (Picture 1) Autumn P (Picture 2) Frankie P (Picture 3) Ellie P (Picture 4).

HISTORY

Year 7 started off with an introduction to Historical Skills and have since moved on to develop their enquiry skills on 'How did the Tollund Man die?'. Students look at a range of sources, their content, their origin and their nature to decide how valid they are in helping them


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answer the question. Student are also introduced to the concept of 'significance' and why the Tollund man is so unique in how he was preserved.

Students have since moved onto the settlers and migrants that came to England during the Dark Ages, to forge a comparison to the following topic on The Battle of Hastings and the impact that William I had on England.

Year 8 started their academic year with a new topic, where they learnt about the causes and consequences of the Renaissance, and how this sparked the Reformation that enabled Henry VIII to break with Rome, form his own church and re-marry. Students within each lesson analysed the issue of religion and how this led to the Tudor 'religious roller-coaster' which stemmed from the changes in Europe, and Henry VIII's desire for a male heir.




Students are now learning about how far Elizabeth dealt with her problems, looking at Spain, marriage, colonisation and Mary Queen of Scots.

Year 9 began their academic year by looking at the 'Causes of WW1', looking at the MAIN issues (militarism, alliances, imperialism and nationalism) beginning with the rise of German nationalism from winning the Franco-Prussian war and Serbia rising out of the Balkans Wars, as a challenge to Austria-Hungary. These complicated political issues really put into context why the Assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand happened and students could compare, analyse and evaluate the most significant cause/s of WW1 in the short and long term. Students are looking at historians' interpretations of the past in both their lessons and assessments, to draw links towards how historians form opinions and why they differ. In the second part of the term, students are learning about the impact and changes that WW1 brought to those in the 20th century; looking at topics such as medicine, military technology, the Home front, soldiers of the empire and women.



When the Great War broke out in 1914, a great rush of young men in Britain volunteered to fight for 'king and country' But there was also lots of enthusiasm in countries that were part of the British Empire. The British Empire was a collection of countries that were ruled by Britain, and when the war started places such as Canada. Australia, New Zealand, West Indies, South Africa and other parts of Africa were under British rule. These places were known as colonies. As a result, mary thousands of people from these areas decided to join up to fight with the British. In fact, this was lucky for Britain, because when war broke out there were ten times as many soldiers in the German Army, as there were British . So the British army had no choice but to use these 'soldiers of the empire'.



MUSIC

Our music students are enjoying a very busy run-in to the holiday period with preparation for our annual Christmas Concert and the first Battle of the Bands competition. It is wonderful to have so many musicians wanting to express their performances to well-support audiences. Their support for each other and community spirit has been well observed with acts of support and encouragement for each other in the Christmas Concert. _

With around 50 students involved in each of our end-of-year productions, we are feeling our music and performance community grow. We have been impressed with our students' resilience as they have worked and rehearsed tirelessly to create fantastic performances for our supporters to enjoy.

With 11 bands competing for such awards as 2024 Champions, Best KS3 band, Best Audience Participation, Best Band Image, Best Individual Performer, and Most Outrageous Rock Band Ending, there is plenty of opportunity for our performers to impress our team of four judges. We are ex-

Year 7 have started World Views with a bang! Their philosophical and

debating skills have been impressive. We have had many enjoyable lessons exploring what makes the identity of not only ourselves but also our local community. Our recent discussions around the Church and asking,' Is it still important for Wellington today', was lively and resulted in a unanimous decision that it is still important due to all the support, guidance, groups and celebrations it holds for the local community.

Year 8

In a growing economic crisis here in GB and across the globe, Year 8 have been learning about poverty. We started by understanding the global goals and the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child. We have explored the use of food banks,






As always, it has been a busy term in the Modern Foreign Languages faculty!! At the end of September, we held our annual House & Tutor Group competition to mark the European Day of Languages, and to promote the importance of language skills in today's multicultural society. The winning tutor groups in each Year were: 7B1, 8C2, 9D2, 10B2, 11M1 but DUKE emerged as the overall winning house!

In curriculum time in Spanish, Year 7 have been finding out more about Spanish-

speaking countries and communities around the world, and learning the fundamentals of the language. The particular focus has been upon the way words are pronounced (phonics), as well as using an increasing variety of vocabulary and grammatical structures to talk about their age, birthdays, pets, siblings and personality. In **Year 8**, students have been learning to talk in greater depth about a range of different aspects of holidays, such as transport, accommodation, activities and opinions. In **Year 9**, students have written about their varied likes and dislikes, learned to talk about what they do in their spare time and discussed how they plan to celebrate an upcoming birthday. They have also produced a review of a film of their choice, based upon an example review.

Students in **Year 10** have begun their GCSE courses, while **Year 11** students have been revising hard for their recent PPEs.



GEOGRAPHY

Year 7 started off with an introduction to the continent of Africa. Students have shown a fantastic awareness of the world around them and have developed an understanding of some of Africa's human and

physical features, as well as their ecosystems. In addition to this, our Year 7 students have started to develop their awareness of global issues and showed fantastic maturity and consideration for those that are less fortunate when looking at the issue of famine and drought in parts of Africa. A big well done to Year 7! As we look ahead, our Year 7s will now begin to look at landscapes and the impact of climate change.

Year 8 started their academic year with the topic of settlement, within this they have learnt about the different types of settlement and have linked this to the presence of services and the threshold population. In addition to this, they all explored the challenges faced in settlements around the world, such as the megacity of Mumbai. They have now started their enquiries in Wellington and shown resilience and bravery when speaking to the public for their questionnaires – now its time to find out their results!

Year 9 began their academic year by looked at the tectonic hazards. In this topic, they explored the earth's tectonic plates and looked at how their movement can cause a range of hazards such as earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and tsunamis. Students have been developing their case study knowledge looking at real world examples of each hazard, such as the Lombok earthquake of 2019, and the infamous Indian Ocean tsunami of 2004. We have been really impressed with our Year 9s and the attitude they have shown towards this, they have been considerate the shown empathy when studying this and have shown maturity when considering the effects and responses to each event. As they move towards Christmas, Year 9 are going to start looking at population – this will include looking at the reasons for population increase and the challenges this poses.

Year 10 have had a wonderful start to the year and have worked hard to adapt to the demands of GCSE Geography. They started the year exploring urban environments including the opportunities and challenges in megacities, before illustrating this with their case study of Rio de Jeneiro. They then had some time to focus much closer to home, with the regeneration of Bristol and the opportunities it brings to the south west. Ending this half term, students have started to focus on weather hazards including global atmospheric circulation and the impacts of Ty-




phoon Haiyan. They will shortly begin to the look at the causes and mitigation of climate change as they head into the new year.

Year 11 have had a busy start to the year in Geography, looking at the living world and exploring the major world biomes, as well as the threats and management taken to sustain them. This has included the impacts of deforestation and increasing levels of desertification. They have then moved on to consider resource management, looking at how we can sustain the water, food and energy resources on the planet. All students have shown a good attitude to their geography PPE and have done their 6 week revision plan to help them prepare and support them in experiencing success in the lead up to their final exams.

Anti-Bullying Week

Throughout this term we have ensured tutor time, PSHCE and lessons support students with their wellbeing and mental health. We continue to be impressed with how well our students have adapted to the challenges faced following the pandemic. We have promoted positive mental health that includes advice and guidance on how to look after ourselves. On the further pages in this magazine there are some great resources and places to get tips and strategies to support daily self-care. We are fortunate to have many people wanting to work with us over the next year to continue to promote and develop our curriculum. Anti -Bullying week saw students take part in a range of activities and really promoted #Bekind and the theme 'Choose Respect'. The focus was on peer support and everyone in our community supporting to stop bullying.
